

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Congressman Wolf's Voting Record

First Session, 99th Congress — January 3-December 20, 1985

Dear Friends:

Continuing my practice of making my complete voting record available to the people of the 10th District, I am sending this report which contains my voting record for the first session of the 99th Congress. This record has been mailed to 10th District citizens each year since I began serving in the House of Representatives in 1981 in the 97th Congress. Very few members of Congress publish comprehensive voting records; but I believe it is important for you to know how I have voted on all matters coming before Congress.

This report includes every vote I made during the first session of the 99th Congress which convened on January 3 and adjourned December 20, 1985. My voting attendance record for the first session was 98 percent.

Included again this year on page 2 is a glossary of terms used to describe the votes which I hope will help you better understand the legislative process. The voting record is arranged by general subject areas as follows: Each vote begins with the roll call number, followed by the number of the bill or resolution being considered and a description of the question on which the vote was taken, including amendments, motions and passage. Next is my own vote on the measure in-

icated by "yes" or "no" followed by the vote of the entire House of Representatives, indicated by "passed" or "failed" followed by the yes-no vote total. The date on which the vote occurred is listed at the end. There were a total of 482 roll calls for the first session. That total includes 104 procedural votes such as approving the speaker's journal, quorum calls and motions to adjourn. Those procedural votes are not listed. Votes taken under suspension of the rules are indicated and an explanation of that procedure may be found in the glossary.

As we become involved in the important and challenging issues facing the nation in the second session of the 99th Congress, your views are encouraged and welcome. I hope you find this voting record information helpful and that you will share your opinions with me on this report and other matters of interest and concern to you.

AGRICULTURAL & RURAL AFFAIRS

(17) H.Res. 79, rule providing for consideration of H.R. 1035, bill to authorize emergency credit and debt adjustment relief to financially stressed farmers and ranchers. Yes. Passed 331-91. 2/27/85.

(18) H.R. 1035. On passage of the emergency farm credit bill to authorize advance Commodity Credit Corporation crop loans to farmers, to authorize \$3 billion in Farmers Home Administration loan guarantees for restructured private loans to farmers, to revise rules for the FmHA loan guarantees and to authorize low-interest federal disaster loans to farmers in certain circumstances. Yes. Passed 318-103. 2/27/85.

(20) H.Res. 85, rule to consider H.R. 1189, supplemental appropriations for FY 1985 for emergency farm credit. No. Passed 260-149. 2/28/85.

(21) H.R. 1189, bill to appropriate \$1 billion for Farmers Home Administration guarantees of restructured farm loans by

private lenders, restricted to farmers with debt-to-asset ratios of at least 75 percent, to increase by \$17 million appropriations for FmHA salaries and expenses, and to provide \$500,000 for a study of the impact of agricultural trade embargos. Yes. Passed 294-115. 2/28/85.

(254) H.R. 3037, bill appropriating \$33.1 billion for the Department of Agriculture and related agencies for FY 1986. Yes. Passed 354-71. 7/24/85.

(316) H.Res. 267, rule to consider H.R. 2100, Food Security Act (1985 farm-bill). No. Passed 205-99. 9/20/85.

(318) H.R. 2100, Food Security Act. Amendment to lower the price support level for sugar and eliminate the cost of transportation as a factor in determining the market stabilization price. Yes. Failed 142-263. 9/26/85.

(319) H.R. 2100. Amendment to delete the dairy program provisions in the bill and provide a dairy price support level in FY 1986 at \$11.10 per hundredweight with 50 cents annual reductions until certain purchase levels are met. Yes. Failed 166-244. 9/26/85.

(320) H.R. 2100. Amendment to establish a mandatory supply management dairy program if approved by 60 percent of dairy farmers in a national

referendum. No. Failed 36-351. 9/26/85.

(322) H.R. 2100, Food Security Act. Amendment to establish target prices for wheat at \$4.50 per bushel for the first 15,000 bushels and \$4 per bushel for any additional bushels, and mandate the marketing loan provisions. Yes. Failed 200-228. 10/1/85.

(323) H.R. 2100. Amendment to freeze the 1986 target prices for wheat at current levels and reduce the prices annually thereafter through 1990. No. Failed 93-334. 10/1/85.

(325) H.R. 2100. Amendment to add the cotton, rice and soybean programs to the national referendum requirements for producer approval before prices become effective. Yes. Failed 107-319. 10/1/85.

(333) H.R. 2100, Food Security Act. Amendment to strike the provisions providing for a producer-approved referendum on wheat and feed grains programs. Yes. Passed 251-174. 10/3/85.

(334) H.R. 2100. Amendment to phase out the price-support and national quota program for peanut producers by 1989, gradually limiting the size of the peanut crop that would come under the national poundage quota, lowering the price-support level and allowing growers not holding a quota to compete for the

domestic market in order to meet demand. Yes. Failed 195-228. 10/3/85.

(335) H.R. 2100. Amendment to exempt agriculture export credit programs from the cargo-preference requirements that half of all government-generated exports be shipped on U.S. flag vessels. Yes. Failed 179-245. 10/3/85.

(336) H.R. 2100. Amendment to require the Maritime Administration to pay the cost of subsidies incurred by applying cargo-preference requirements to agricultural export programs. No. Failed 151-269. 10/3/85.

(337) H.R. 2100. Amendment to bring highly erodible crop land farmed in 1981-85 under the sanctions of the bill's "sodbuster" provisions by 1995, or two years after completion of soil maps, whichever is later, with the requirement that such land must be planted under an approved conservation plan by 1990. Yes. Passed 313-90. 10/3/85.

(338) H.R. 2100, Food Security Act. Amendment to make changes in the food stamp program, including eliminating proposed increases in excess shelter expenses, dependent care, and earned income. Yes. Failed 171-238. 10/7/85.

(339) **H.R. 2100.** Amendment to require states to set up employment and training programs for food stamp recipients and to establish minimum participation rates in these programs. **Yes.** Failed 183-227. 10/7/85.

(340) **H.R. 2100.** Amendment to limit the principal balance of nonrecourse loans for honey producers to \$250,000. **Yes.** Passed 340-65. 10/7/85.

(342) **H.R. 2100,** Food Security Act. Amendment to repeal tobacco price support programs effective in 1986. **No.** Failed 195-230. 10/8/85.

(344) **H.R. 2100.** Amendment to establish separate referendums on mandatory production control programs for grain farmers, soybean farmers, rice farmers and cotton farmers, with approval for each crop program based on a 60 percent majority vote. If grain farmers disapprove of the mandatory controls, the agriculture secretary would be required to allow farmers to repay their wheat and feed grain crop loans at no higher than state average market prices. **No.** Failed 52-371. 10/8/85.

(345) **H.R. 2100.** Amendment to establish a mandatory production control program for all major commodities if approved by a majority of farmers in a national referendum which must be held every four years, or to establish programs for all major commodities by the Agriculture Department if controls are not approved. **No.** Failed 59-368. 10/8/85.

(346) **H.R. 2100.** Amendment to prohibit any type of federal farm assistance to any farmer with 10 or more field hand employees who fails to provide drinking water and field sanitation facilities. **No.** Failed 199-227. 10/8/85.

(347) **H.R. 2100.** On passage of the Food Security Act to extend and revise agricultural price support and related pro-

grams, to provide for agricultural export, resource conservation, farm credit, and agricultural research and related programs, and to continue food assistance to low-income persons through FY 1990. **No.** Passed 282-141. 10/8/85.

(442) **S. 1884,** bill to restructure and reform the Farm Credit System. **Yes.** Passed 393-32, under suspension of rules. 12/10/85.

(157) **H.R. 2577.** Amendment to set

forth U.S. policy objectives and strategies with respect to Nicaragua, provide \$14 million for humanitarian assistance to Nicaraguan refugees outside of Nicaragua to be distributed by the Red Cross or the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees, and provide authority for the use of funds for implementation of the Contadora peace process. **No.** Failed 174-254. 6/12/85.

(158) **H.R. 2577.** On passage of the bill to provide \$13.5 billion in supplemental appropriations for FY 1985. **Yes.** Passed 271-156. 6/12/85.

(277) **H.R. 2577,** supplemental appropriations for FY 1985. To agree to the conference report on the bill providing \$13.02 billion in supplemental spending for FY 1985 for various government programs and for pay raises for federal employees. **Yes.** Passed 320-106. 7/31/85.

(278) **H.R. 2577.** Motion that the House recede from its disagreement to the conference committee amendment to provide \$48.8 million for 41 water projects of the Army Corps of Engineers, so long as federal and local cost-sharing agreements are reached by June 30, 1986. **Yes.** Failed 170-258. 7/31/85. (Note: House subsequently adopted a motion making the appropriation for the water projects subject to enactment of authorizing legislation specifying a cost-sharing agreement and by agreeing to the motion, the House receded from its disagreement to the amendment.)

Glossary of Terms Used in Voting Record Report

Amendment — A proposal of a member of Congress to alter the language, provisions or stipulations in a bill or in another amendment. It is usually printed, debated, and voted upon in the same way as a bill.

Appropriations bill — Provides the actual monies approved by authorization bills, but not necessarily the full amount authorized.

Authorization bill — Basic, substantive legislation that establishes or continues the legal operation of a federal program or agency, either indefinitely or for a specific period, or which sanctions a particular type of obligation or expenditure.

Bill — A legislative proposal, designated as H.R. in the House of Representatives and S. in the Senate, followed by a number assigned in the order in which it is introduced during the two-year period in which a Congress is convened. If enacted by both houses of Congress in the same form and signed by the President, a bill becomes a law.

Calendar Wednesday — A procedure to bypass the Rules Committee and provide that the House committees, in alphabetical order, may call up legislation for House floor consideration.

Committee of the Whole — A procedural device designed to expedite the legislative work of the House in which slightly less formal rules for the conduct of debate and voting upon amendments apply.

Concurrent resolution — A resolution, designated as H. Con. Res. or S. Con. Res., passed by both houses of Congress not requiring or intended for approval by the President and therefore without the force of law. It is often used to express the "sense of Congress" on various foreign policy or domestic issues.

Conference — A meeting between the representatives of the House and Senate to reconcile differences between the two houses over provisions of a bill passed by both chambers. A majority of the members of the conference from each chamber must agree on the provisions of the bill before it can be considered by either chamber in the form of a "conference report." There it cannot be amended and if not approved, the bill may go back to conference or a new conference must be convened. Bills that are passed by both houses with only minor differences need

not be sent to conference; either chamber may "concur" in the other's amendments, completing action on the legislation.

Continuing resolution — a joint resolution drafted by Congress "continuing appropriations" for specific ongoing activities of a government department or departments when a fiscal year begins and Congress has not yet enacted all of the regular appropriations bills for that year.

House — The House of Representatives, as distinct from the Senate, although each body is a "house" of Congress.

Joint resolution — A resolution, designated H. J. Res. or S. J. Res., which requires the approval of both houses and the signature of the President, just as a bill does, and has the force of law if approved. It is generally limited to special circumstances. A joint resolution is also used to propose amendments to the Constitution. Under that purpose, it does not require a presidential signature and becomes a part of the Constitution when three-fourths of the states ratify it.

Previous question — A request for the previous question, or a motion on the previous question in the House brings to a vote the question of whether debate should end and the merits of the pending issue should be voted upon.

Resolution — A simple resolution, designated H. Res. or S. Res. deals with matters entirely within the prerogatives of one house or the other. It requires neither passage by the other chamber nor approval by the President, does not have the force of law and is commonly used for internal business of that house or for expressing views of that house.

Rule — A resolution from the House Rules Committee, which, if adopted by the House, sets the procedures and time limits for debate and voting on a pending bill or resolution.

Suspension of rules — Procedure in the House intended for the passage of non-controversial bills under which debate is limited to 40 minutes, no amendments from the floor are permitted, and a two-thirds vote of those members present is required for passage.

(461) **H.J.Res. 465**, to agree to the conference report on the resolution to provide continued appropriations through Sept. 30, 1986, for government agencies whose regular FY 1986 appropriations had not become law. **Yes.** Failed 170-239. 12/16/85.

(463) **H.J.Res. 491**, further continuing appropriations for FY 1986. Motion to recommit the resolution to the Appropriations Committee with instructions to report it back with an amendment to prohibit the Synthetic Fuels Corporation from awarding any money for projects. **Yes.** Passed 392-20. 12/17/85.

(464) **H.J.Res. 491**, resolution to provide continued spending authority through Dec. 19, 1985, for government agencies whose regular FY 1986 appropriations had not become law. **Yes.** Passed 334-74. 12/17/85.

(476) **H.J.Res. 465**, to approve the conference report on the continuing appropriations resolution to provide \$368.1 billion in FY 1986 for government agencies whose regular appropriations had not become law. **Yes.** Passed 261-137. 12/19/85.

(123) **H.Res. 177**. On passage of the rule to consider H.Con.Res. 152, budget resolution for FY 1986. **Yes.** Passed 273-141. 5/22/85.

(125) **H.Con.Res. 152**. Amendment (Pursell substitute) to budget resolution to freeze all programs during FY 1986 at FY 1985 levels with further reductions in 75 specific programs. **No.** Failed 87-335. 5/22/85.

(126) **H.Con.Res. 152**. Amendment (Leland substitute) to budget resolution to freeze defense authority during FY 1986 at the FY 1985 levels and reduce such authority during FYs 1987 and 1988 through the elimination of several major weapons systems; provide a 25 percent

minimum tax on corporations; and provide tax relief for low and moderate incomes. **No.** Failed 54-361. 5/22/85.

Amendment (Latta substitute) to budget resolution to increase defense at the rate of inflation for FY 1986 with 3 percent growth in 1987 and 1988; freeze domestic discretionary programs, and provide for full COLAs for Social Security and other entitlement programs. **No.** Failed 102-329. 5/23/85.

(129) **H.Con.Res. 152**. Amendment to reduce the deficit by \$75 billion in FY 1986 and by \$350 billion over FYs 1986-88, by eliminating increases in COLAs for recipients of Social Security and other federal retirement programs and by raising \$12 billion in new taxes, in combination with spending cuts. **No.** Failed 56-372. 5/23/85.

(130) **H.Con.Res. 152**. Amendment to express the sense of the House that the Ways and Means Committee should report legislation imposing a minimum federal income tax, with new revenues to be used to reduce either tax rates or the federal budget deficit. **No.** Failed 142-283. 5/23/85.

(131) **H.Con.Res. 152**. On passage of the budget resolution for FY 1986 to set budget targets as follows: budget authority, \$1,051.5 billion; outlays, \$959.1 billion; revenues \$794.1 billion; deficit, \$165 billion. **No.** Passed 258-170. 5/23/85.

Motion that the House conferees on the resolution be instructed to return with an amendment to the Budget Control and Impoundment Act with mechanisms for deficit reductions, including specific mandatory budget goals for a balanced budget in the next six years. **Yes.** Passed 354-15. 10/11/85.

(367) **H.Res. 296**, rule to consider H.R. 3500, Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985. **Yes.** Passed 230-190. 10/23/85.

(370) **H.R. 3500**, Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985. Amendment to strike the authorizations for all new and most existing housing programs, the Ocean and Coastal Resources Management and Development Block Grant Program, and the Coastal Zone Management Act; place the highway and airport trust funds off budget in 1989; reduce federal civilian pay increases in 1987 and 1988; and retain the 75 percent cap on the federal share of premium payments made to the Federal Employee Health Benefit Plan. **No.** Failed 209-219. 10/24/85.

(371) **H.R. 3500**. Amendment to strike provisions in the bill to remove from the budget the highway (including the mass transit account) and airport trust funds. **Yes.** Passed 222-205. 10/24/85.

(381) **H.Res. 301**, rule to consider H.R. 3128, deficit reduction amendments. Motion to order the previous question and end debate on the rule. **No.** Passed 219-205. 10/31/85.

(382) **H.R. 3128**, deficit reduction amendments. Motion to recommit the bill to the Ways and Means Committee with instructions to strike out all new spending proposals. **Yes.** Failed 183-238. 10/31/85.

(383) **H.R. 3128**. On passage of the bill providing \$19.2 billion in deficit reduction savings over FYs 1986-88 through medicare changes and revenue-raising measures, but including spending increases of \$1.8 billion for certain programs. **No.** Passed 245-174. 10/31/85.

(385) **H.J. Res. 372**, resolution to increase the ceiling on the public debt. Motion to recede from disagreement with the Senate amendment to the bill to increase the public debt limit. **Yes.** Passed 288-134. 11/1/85.

(386) **H.J.Res. 372**. Motion to recede from the House position and concur with the Senate amendment to the bill to increase the public debt limit, with a substitute Democratic alternative to provide for a balanced budget and deficit reduction process. **No.** Passed 249-180. 11/1/85.
